

Head Teacher Update		Shalford Celebrates....																	
<p>Dear Families,</p> <p>Those of you who were here last winter will remember the ongoing problems that we had with our boilers. I am very pleased to share that thanks to Learning Partners Academy Trust, we had both of our boilers replaced over the summer holidays. So, we are looking forward to being nice and warm all winter this year! As well as the boiler works, we also had our fire alarm system replaced, again thanks to Learning Partners, and the floor in the Oasis was replaced over the holiday too, it was a busy summer.</p> <p>On Friday 22nd September we will be raising awareness and money for Jeans for Genes Day. Individually, genetic disorders are rare but together they affect 1 in 25 children born in the UK - that's more than 30,000 babies each year. We are inviting all children and adults to pay £1 to wear their jeans on that day. School children will need to wear their school polo shirt, jumper and normal school shoes.</p> <p>Our first Welcome Wednesday of the year will take place on 18th October at 2.45pm. This is an opportunity for you to come into the classrooms of Oak, Ash and Pine Classes and look through your children's books, look at the classroom displays and talk about your child's learning with your child. These sessions take place on the last Wednesday of every half term (except for December as the last week of term is very busy!). Please note that your child's teacher will not be available to talk to, but if you would like to speak to them you are free to make an appointment for another time.</p> <p>It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school or nursery when they are unwell. Candidates are also invited to make posters/badges/rosettes etc. to persuade their fellow classmates to vote for them.</p> <p>Key skills in being a school councillor include the ability to listen to others, accept that your idea might not be the one finally chosen and also to have the confidence to talk in a group and share ideas.</p> <p>A new School Council is formed during the autumn term every year. The elected members then have the job of representing the views of their classes at our meetings. We pride ourselves on being a caring school with a positive atmosphere and many visitors to the school have remarked upon this. We explicitly teach the children 11 (5 in nursery) values over the school year. We focus on one specific value each month. In school the children have a values assembly where they listen to stories and discuss what each value means and in addition to this they also have special values lessons in their classroom to allow for smaller group discussion.</p> <p>Last term we reviewed the 11 values for the first time and asked for feedback from children, parents, staff and governors regarding the values. Within the space of a few years, it has become shockingly common place for those underage to be in the possession of these devices. Often brightly coloured, often sold at off-licences and often flavoured with sweet tastes which seem almost to be designed for children. It is of vital importance that children are well aware of the potential health implications of this new trend. Action for Children have published a webpage on the matter, and it's well worth a read if you have older children and are worried about them vaping.</p>
